What is the Early Years Childhood Immunisation Project?

The main purpose of this project is to enable and empower staff working in Early Years settings to raise awareness and promote pre-school vaccinations, including MMR, among parents and carers.

The project is designed to protect children and staff in Early Years settings against infectious diseases by promoting the uptake of immunisations. Ensuring all children and staff are up to date with their vaccinations will protect them and those around them from disease.

The project includes free training and resources for you and your staff to support the promotion of childhood vaccinations. The project is being delivered by the SCW Improving Immunisation Uptake team (IIUT) and is funded by NHS England.

What is on offer?

- A one-hour virtual training session for staff (6 dates and times available)
- An electronic Childhood Immunisations a guide for Early Years providers
- A support pack with further resources
- Signposting to trusted resources

What are the benefits for you and your setting?

- Increase confidence in having vaccine conversations and signposting parents / carers to reliable information
- · Raise awareness of immunisations within the setting
- Reduce the risks of infections
- Reduce the risks of an outbreak
- Fulfil duty of care

- Support achieving compliance with Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) need to have knowledge of common childhood illnesses and immunisation

Why is this project being funded?
