

Supporting wraparound providers to provide inclusive provision

From September 2024, all parents and carers of primary school-aged children who need it have been able to access term time childcare in their local area from 8am-6pm, so they can access employment and improve labour market participation.

Childcare Works is supporting local authorities with the rollout of the National Wraparound Programme during our work with local authorities, an area of support identified has been supporting wraparound providers with inclusion and SEND.

Childcare Works delivered an online session, supporting wraparound providers to provide inclusive provision, for local authorities with the aim of providing an opportunity for local authority officers to reflect and refresh their thinking on SEND and inclusion in wraparound provision.
